

Further investigation of this site is planned by Mr Park, particularly to establish whether the 14 inches of soil overburden as well as the established forest cover is in fact no older than local Maori penetrations into the area.

At the moment (19/6/68) there is equal argument for the obsidian and charcoal being are soil deposition or the two being related to a fire-bit which was dug into the soil down to greywacke.

The presence of this evidence of Maori occupation suggests that this site may have lain on a trail or route that crossed from the Wairarapa to the Upper Hutt Valley then on to the West coast. This area also affords an excellent view over the entire Upper Valley area. Trampers who know the area suggest that this is likely to have been a direct route through to the Wairarapa in Maori times.

The alternative to the above suggestion is that the site marks the position of an old Maori birding camo site.
